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My apologies. This newsletter is late because of me. I did not get my article written before leaving town. I had a lot to get done before taking our youth to Higher Things as this year I presented a topic at the conference and also gave one of the sermons. This meant I had a lot of things to get ready before leaving and then, unexpectedly, we had two funerals in the weeks prior. All of this being the case, my article was put on the back burner and I am just getting to it now. Again, I apologize for the inconvenience of receiving this letter late.

Higher Things. We had another great trip and conference with our youth. 21 people from Lord of Life (Three adult chaperones and 18 youth) traveled to Concordia University in Seward, Nebraska. We left after church on June 23rd and arrived that evening in Lincoln, NE. The next day the conference started and what an experience it was! The theme this year was "Concordia" and appropriately, all five conferences are being held at different Concordia Universities across the country. At our conference there were about 450 people present, most of them were high school youth, but a number of pastors, youth workers and some younger and older kids were also in attendance. We had worship services in the morning, afternoon, and evening every day led by a variety of pastors from different places. I was invited to preach at one of the Matins services and considered it a real honor to be asked. Truth be told, I preached at a Higher Things conference about 10 years ago in Irvine, CA and took some flak for exceeding (or maybe doubling) the 5 minute time limit I was given. I haven't been asked to preach again until this year when at last the organization was willing to take another chance! So, I worked hard to turn in a 5 minute sermon this time (which I was told, ended up being closer to 7 minutes.) Higher Things has loosened the schedule up quite a bit from those early years to allow more flex time in between worship services and all the sessions. Now all of the preachers tend to exceed the 5 minute limit and mine was one of the shorter sermons, so hopefully it won't be another decade until the next time I get to preach!

In addition to worship, the Higher Things conferences offer plenary speakers and several smaller breakout sessions where students can choose among various topics and speakers. This year one of the plenary speakers was Rev. Joel Fritsche, missionary to the Dominican Republic. This year I also decided to lead one of the breakout sessions and the topic I chose was: suicide. By no means was it a feel-good topic, but it is an important one to talk about with youth. Suicide is now the 2nd highest leading cause of death among young people. The suicide rate has increased steadily for 20 years, which means even if the students at Higher Things do not have to deal with suicidal thoughts themselves, nevertheless, they will likely have to deal with the fallout of a suicide from a classmate, coworker, or even a family member or friend. As a pastor, I have been asked about this topic on numerous occasions, so basically my presentation sought to help young Christians think through the issue and learn what the Bible has to say about it. When I was young, I was simply told that if someone committed suicide, they did not live to repent of their sin and were damned as a result of it. This all-too-common answer is all-too-simple and doesn't help people who are grieving the loss of a loved one due to suicide. That answer also does not reflect more modern understandings of mental illness. I plan to give my presentation during the adult Bible Study

hour some Sunday at Lord of Life, so if this topic is interesting to you, watch the bulletins for information and plan to attend.

Iowa. Because the HT conference was in Nebraska this year, I took the opportunity to visit my father in Iowa afterwards. I really appreciated the time off and the opportunity to be with my family. We had a great time and even got to take the kids to Adventureland –the amusement park where I spent many fun-filled summer days as a youth. It was a great trip, but it is also good to be back.

In Memorial...

Phyllis Summer. At age 97, Phyllis' death on June 6th was not a surprise. She had declined over the last few months; however, it is remarkable that up until this time, she had been so healthy for so much of her very long life. She was the oldest living member of Lord of Life. Phyllis loved her family and her church and was deeply committed to both. As a church member, she was a Stephen's Minister and Sunday school teacher, she volunteered in LWML and participated in small groups. (Most of her volunteering and was over by the time I met her, so if she did even more than I've mentioned, it would not surprise me.) Before she stopped driving, Phyllis would drop in to the church office just to say hello and see what was going on. She spoke openly and excitedly about her faith in God and shared the joy she had with others. Phyllis touched many lives and was loved by many. Her memorial service was held at Lord of Life on the 22nd. She will be missed.

Joyce Bamsch. A few days after Phyllis passed away, Joyce Bamsch ended her time on earth on June 9th at the age of 84. Joyce was a joyful soul and a charter member of our congregation. I got to know Joyce over the years and quickly learned that Joyce was a devout Christian whose love of Christ permeated all aspects of her life. Joyce had been in declining health for some time, but in the days leading up to her death it became increasingly obvious that death was inevitable. Accordingly, Joyce and I shared some very frank discussions about death and her desire to depart and be with Christ. On the day of her death, Joyce gave a moving demonstration of her faith, calling all of her children and grandchildren to her side and urging them to be faithful to God and go to church. When I prayed with her the last time, it was

after she also encouraged me with Scripture and blessings. What a beautiful way to die; what a tremendous witness to give! We had a great funeral for Joyce on the 15th with many in attendance.

LWML 38th Biennial Convention Summary



The Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) welcomed 3105 people with 691 as first timers to the LWML Convention in Mobile, Alabama, June 20–23, 2019, under the theme "In Praise to the LORD!" The convention theme was based on 1 Chronicles 16:23–24a.

LWML Sets 2019–2021 Mission Goal at \$2.1 Million

Delegates to the 38th Biennial Convention of the LWML adopted a \$2,100,000 mission goal for the 2019–2021 biennium. This goal, by the grace of God, will fund 21 mission grants as men and women respond in prayer and offerings during the next two years. LWML chose to support the following mission grants, pledging their support with prayers and mites (offerings) given over the next biennium:
