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Back to Bible Study

Recently we returned to having in-person Bible study at Lord of Life. The study is on the Gospel of Mark and the discussion has been great! We are also live streaming our study so people can participate online. Please join us and take advantage of this opportunity to be in the Word.

In addition to studying Mark, we are also beginning each session with a reading from Brief Insights on Mastering the Bible, by Michael S. Heiser. This book is one of a series of books called the 60-Second Scholar Series. Each of the 80 chapters is about 2 pages long and covers some principle of Bible interpretation (i.e. hermeneutics.) The idea is that by covering briefly some principle of interpretation each week, over time, we will discuss a number of important subjects and improve the way we study Holy Scripture.

Hesier caught my attention when a portion of one these brief chapters was featured in a Christian magazine. Let me share it with you here:

Study is a Verb

If you don't think Bible study is work, you aren't doing it.

Bible study is *work*. The word "study" implies activity and effort. I know from experience that this truism is foreign to many. There are reasons for that.

Some people never graduate from Bible reading to Bible study. Reading doesn't require much effort, especially if you aren't thinking while doing it. Running your eyes over words on a page is one of the easiest things an adult does at any given point of their day. But Bible reading isn't Bible study.

Others associate Bible study with "getting a blessing." This confuses devotional reading with study. The goal of Bible study isn't a spiritual buzz. Bible study isn't in search of a feeling. It's in search of understanding what the Biblical text says and what it means. That isn't to suggest personal application is irrelevant or ought to be avoided. Instead, it's to suggest that "applying" anything in the Bible without knowing what it means is at best useless and at worst dangerous.

Another reason is that small group Bible studies are usually passive. Little actual study happens, at least for anyone other than the person tasked with leading the group. While the leader may have put serious work into the effort, everyone else is a listener. True, the material may stimulate questions, but asking a question isn't Bible study. It's where Bible study often begins.

Most of us know that "study" is a verb. You know that if you went to college, prepared for your driver's license exam, wanted to research a pending medical procedure, or are serious about fantasy sports. A better synonym for Bible study than "reading" would be "research." And research isn't easy. It takes tools, tenacity, and time.




This insight about "studying" the Bible as opposed to merely reading it or just sharing thoughts about it without actually doing any research struck me as particularly on point. That is, while a lot of people read the Bible and some even talk about it, it seems that fewer actually study/research it. How about you? Do you actually study the Bible as a disciple? ("disciple" is another loaded term having to do with disciplined study!) Or, do you just read the Bible and like talking about it with friends?

On Sunday mornings we do a little of both. I lead a study and try to get people into the text, but we also discuss the implications of it with each other and how to apply the Word to our lives. Hopefully, you will both receive a blessing and do some research.




