### Are you a disciple or a fan?

Popular Evangelical author, Kyle Idlemann wrote a book years ago called, "Not a Fan". The book explored how so many Christians are more similar to fans of a sports team than to the disciples Jesus calls us to be. For example, sports fans are often fickle and temperamental. When the team is winning, the stands are full, but when the team is struggling, the fans stay home and maybe even switch their allegiance to another team. This is how many are with Jesus. They like Him. They think well of Him. When asked, they say they are on His team: "I'm a Christian." But when things get tough, when being a Christian means real suffering (like Jesus promised,\*) then the fans disappear. Their devotion only goes so far.

Jesus demands a total life-long commitment, not a passing fondness or appreciation whenever it is convenient for you. Think, for example, of His words to the disciples: "Whoever loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me, and whoever loves son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me. And whoever does not take his cross and follow me is not worthy of me. Whoever finds his life will lose it, and whoever loses his life for my sake will find it." (Matthew 10:37-39) This command to take up one's cross is repeated in different contexts and sometimes the word "daily" is added, (see: Luke 9:23). To take up one's cross also implies that following Jesus will involve punishment and suffering because in His day, crosses were instruments of death, not pretty pieces of jewelry!

It is difficult to think about our commitment to Jesus in these terms –in terms of suffering and dying for His cause. It is much easier to swallow (and you probably get a bigger following in the short term) when you suggest people should become fans of Jesus and root for His team. When we try and make the whole experience of being a Christian something that is fun, easy and enjoyable, we can probably get more hangers-on who claim to be Christians. But like the people at Capernaum who happily accepted free food from Jesus, then abandoned Him when He spoke about the mysteries of the kingdom, (John 6:60 ff.) people today do not stay on Jesus' team if they are merely fans and not committed disciples.

In our day the world is increasingly hostile to Christians and the Christian Church. Our culture mocks Christian ideas and blames Christian leaders for failures and hypocrisies they readily tolerate among their own preferred leaders. Many fans of Jesus look at the situation and think Jesus' team is losing. So what do they do? They switch allegiance to science or politics or just lose themselves in celebrity worship, constant entertainment, hedonism, or other idols. It is because so many had it wrong to begin with; they only thought of themselves as fans, not disciples.

The question I want you to consider is: Which one are you?

**John 16:33:** (Jesus replied...) "I have said these things to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world."

His friend(s) might look even better with a fake arrow stuck through their head. You might roll your eyes and think, "they are way too old to be doing this." But, consider this:

These kids could be out partying with the "in crowd" getting sloshed on alcohol and/or drugs. Maybe they are just trying to escape a difficult situation at home for an hour or so, and trick-or treating gives them the opportunity. Maybe they don't have many other friends. The fact is that teenagers live in a hazy halfway world. They are not exactly children, but they are not exactly adults either. Next year when those awkward late night moments happen on your doorstep, have something extra prepared to slip into their knapsack with their candy. Perhaps a small flyer or publication explaining the meaning of the Protestant Reformation and the work of Martin Luther

might be the seed that needs to be planted in their life sharing the message that we are saved by grace through faith. So when you hear the doorbell ring after all the smaller children have returned home with overflowing plastic pumpkins filled with goodies, place your leftover treats that you would have to eat anyway in their bags and tell them to be safe. It can't hurt.


